

### Special Consensus by Darcy Whiteside

Starting in 1975, Greg Cahill has been the backbone of Special Consensus. For 35 years, Greg has allowed the musicians that have come in and out of his band to guide the music, from Chris Jones to Josh Williams. One thing has remained

the same - the quality of music- and his current line -up is no exception.

As a banjo player, I greatly admire Greg's style. He fluidly flows from chordal and melodic styling in some of the jazz influenced numbers (Blue Skies Smiling at Me), to the straight-ahead Scruggs style, as in the finale of the night, Train 45. It's also interesting to see how contemporary his sound is as it blends with his band mates, even though he started Special C before the rest of his band were even born. He said that he has always tried to let the band guide the music and not dictate the music according to a single vision.

Though young, that doesn't mean the rest of his band doesn't have experience. Rick Faris started with his family, the Faris Family Bluegrass Band, when Rick was only seven. He has multiple awards with the Society for the Preservation of Bluegrass Music in America (SPBGMA). His mandolin playing was tasteful and clean. David Thomas plays bass and has played in bluegrass bands through his teens in Alabama. He is a solid bass player and even took the opportunity to shine on instrumental

breaks, noteworthy being the aforementioned Blue Skies Smiling at Me, in tune and on time - not the easiest combination while soloing on bass. Last but not least is Ryan Roberts. Ryan is from Cape Breton Nova Scotia and was a student of JP Cormier (who happened to be playing at Oueen Alexandra Hall the same night as Special C). Rvan makes his home in Nashville now and, like his teacher, is a super-clean, fast picker. Ryan and David are also songwriters, and it's always nice to hear original songs mixed with classic bluegrass music. Special C also played some non-traditional bluegrass songs within their sets, including a Hank Snow classic, "Down the Trail of Aching Hearts", a nod to Ryan's roots. I personally enjoyed the Michael Martin Murphy number "Carolina in the Pines." their second set ender.

Their vocals improved in their second set as they loosened up and started to relax. This is understandable as they had just drove solid from Chicago to Edmonton, blowing two tires on the way, prior to jumping on stage. They were even wondering if they were able to get a sound check in. In no way were their vocals weak in the first set, they just seemed to constantly improve as the night progressed. Even exhausted, they were gracious and talkative, both on-stage and off. They signed autographs and chatted after both sets even though I'm sure they wanted to head to their hotel to crash. At least Greg did. Ryan was last seen heading off to Queen Alexandra Hall to track down JP Cormier to jam; I'm sure, into the early morning hours.

The Bluegrass Orphans introduced Edmonton fans to their new CD "Up to My Knees" as they opened for the Spinney Brothers March 27, 2010 at the Royal Alberta Museum. The Three Hills based band consists of Ed Yourk (guitar) and daughter Amber-Lynn (mandolin) and Paula Spurr (bass). Their per-

formance was met with an enthusiastic welcome from local bluegrass fans that have come to know band members from NBCMS' annual Fall Bluegrass Workshop.

Their CD is produced by Eric Uglum-who many will remember from the band Lost Highway from the U.S. The recording is something that means a lot to the group as Amber-Lynn is moving to British Columbia to pursue her career this summer. Their five years of band work is evident in the group's great dynamics and effective team work on instrumentals. "This feels like our swan song," says Paula. "We are glad we were able to do something and to do a good job."

The CD features eight original tunes including Ed's "Katy Lou" which is an emotional lament to a lost love with purity of heart and sweet high vocals, embellished by Paula and Amber-Lynn. Paula's "Walkin" is a tune that is destined to catch on with bluegrass players; a tune injected with her amazing energy and positive outlook. Amber-Lynn's "Too Caught Up" kicks off the CD in fine style.

A great trio of solid, talented musicians put on a great show to open for the Spinney Brothers. Even as members move on, their CD captured the best of their work over the years, an effort they can be very proud of. Let's hope the NBCMS annual fall Bluegrass workshop attracts these talented musicians back to play and jam with club friends.

### Spinney Brothers by Sheila Hallett

Eastern Canada's bluegrass aficionados, the Spinney Brothers, visited Edmonton March 27, 2010 to treat concert goers to their brand of traditional, southern-flavoured grass. Brothers Allan and Rick Spinney and longtime band member Gary Dalrymple introduced us to Wendell Boutlier,

their new bass player who joined the band when they decided to make music their full time profession this year. Wendell used to play with the Spinney Brothers between 1999 and 2002 and brings to the band a strong voice and love of the classics. His performance of oldies such as "He Stopped Loving Her Today" a George Jones signature song brought the audience to their feet at the end of the show.

Wendell and Rick were called to task for the March 27<sup>th</sup> show at the Royal Alberta Museum as Allan Spinney was suffering from laryngitis and couldn't perform his normal lead vocals for the band. Rick said the band had to delve into their repertoires to find songs that would work without Allen. "This was a challenge—going into a big game without your star quarterback."

The band is facing their busiest year to date since making the decision to make music their full time occupation. In April they played an 8 -day "Maritime Acoustic Tour" with J.P. Cormier-breaking away from pure bluegrass to add in some folk music to the mix to attract new audiences to the band's list of supporters. "We are booking soft seat theatres across the country to attract folk fans and expand their horizons," said Rick. "We've been pondering doing this for a number of years and as time goes by we are seeing life differently. We didn't want to let the opportunity slip by and wonder what would have been."

They are performing in every province with the exception of Manitoba this year and excited to have a new CD "Side By Side" to promote. It was produced by Ron Stewart-a Nashville Bluegrass star that will join them on the Blueberry Bluegrass and County Music Festival stage this summer, playing fiddle. The CD includes five original songs to add to their interpretation of classics. The band will be inducted into the Nova Scotia Country Music Hall of Fame in September, joining Anne Murray, Wilf Carter and Hank Snow as native music legends.

"We're passionate about the music and think we can make a living so we're putting our blood sweat and tears into this. They are booked to tour and perform in the United Kingdom in October, on top of playing every major bluegrass festival in Canada this year.

The band has released eight CDs over the vears since their formation in 1991 and they have a strong following in Canada and have impressed many south of the border, representing Canada at the IBMA showcase several times. Rick and Allan have worked on their own style of 'brother duet' vocals. Allan's guitar and Rick's banjo tie the group together and songs like "Dueling Banjos" showcase their instrumental prowess. Gary Dalrymple joined the band in 1993 and plays mandolin and fiddle and adds harmony to many tunes. Their four-part quartet performance of "Get Down on Your Knees and Pray" leaves no doubt as to why they are crowd favorites at festivals. ### CJSR's Prairie Pickin' May Leave the Airways by Linda Saboe



CJSR-FM88 is a volunteer-run and listener-supported "... radio station that boldly goes where no radio station has gone before... and is Edmonton's only campus-based community

radio station". For well over 10 years Edmontonians enjoyed the sounds of Bluegrass Music thanks to a small group of volunteers that freely gave their time to host the show and to the listeners and the NBCMS that generously supplied monetary and moral support. This was Edmonton's only Bluegrass radio show filling a need before the time of Dave Ward's CKUA Bluegrass hour, CFCW's 'Uptown Bluegrass' with George McKnight and satellite radio.

Arthur and Andrea Berman were the original hosts of the Edmonton show. When they decided to move to BC (where they now host Pacific Pickin') they approached NBCMS for replacements. Wade Hanlon and Carol Newlove were the first to take on this task. Rob Baker joined them and remained with the show for more than 10 years. Another great concert and good example of why you should never miss one. Thanks NBCMS!






grass music and the NBCMS club.

Q: I feel special to be the first bluegrasser to ask a question. Do I get a prize like free tickets or something? My second question is does Kentucky Bluegrass grow in Alberta?

**A.** Asking 2 questions is against the rules (I invent them as I go along). But since you are the first "questioner" then I'm pleased to announce that the answer to your first question is: no, but if you find spelling errrs in this column then you get double the prize.

The answer to your 2nd question is that I've got good news and I've got sad news. First, we all know that the term "bluegrass music" came about from Bill Monroe's "Bluegrass Boys" from the "Bluegrass State" of Kentucky. Kentucky Bluegrass seed is grown and harvested in Alberta on a commercial basis and of course Kentucky Bluegrass sod [it's really green - not blue] looks good when supporting any bluegrass happening.

The sad news is that the Government of Alberta publishes an item titled "Kentucky Bluegrass Field Burner's Handbook". (Ouch!) The handbook even lists "The Ten Commandments of Burning".

One justification for burning Kentucky Bluegrass, so says this government handbook, is that the burning controls stem and leaf rust, and smut. All bluegrasser's know that there is no "smut" in Bluegrass Music - it is safe for women and small children.

A. It is natural while learning the banjo to be lonely, feel awkward, and out of place. I checked with Ron Mercer who is the boss-man of the Fall Bluegrass Workshop. He tells me that although plans are still being finalized for the workshop, that an activity to help new-comers, first-timers, and new-players to be greeted and become acquainted, may appear on the schedule of events that would take place prior to the Friday night festivities.

Stay tuned.

Q. I learned to play fiddle on my daddy's knee but I am still confused about those squiggly marks at the beginning of sheet music. You are probably not a music teacher but what could those squiggly marks possibly mean - can you help me?

**A.** Let's take one thing at a time.....first, how old is your daddy and how old are you? Thank you for identifying yourself as a fiddle player. I can understand why you are confused.

Secondly, to answer your question though (as simply as I can), the squiggly mark that looks like a large dollar sign (before taxes) is called the "treble clef" or "G clef". The large squiggly mark that looks like a cooked shrimp is called the "bass clef".

Musical tones or notes that are above "middle C" [C/ octave 4, 261Hz frequency] are assigned to 5 lines called the "treble <u>staff</u>". The tones and notes lower than "middle C" appear on the 5 lines of the shrimp shaped "bass <u>staff</u>". Together they make the "Grand Staff" and comprise all 7 octaves and 88 notes and half-notes of the piano.

Q. I am a 46 years old and have already passed through my mid-life crisis. I want to learn how to flatpick the guitar and play bluegrass music. In the back of my mind I'm thinking that I may be too old to start learning and may not be able to play good enough. What do you think?



### FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions) by Bryce Ohneck (cont'd)

A. Well here's what I think. Any good midlife crisis is worth repeating. I hope you went crazy and bought a dandy guitar while you were passin' through. But, since is the last **FAQs** question for this issue I have to be serious here. Being too old or not being good at it has never stopped any one of our club's flat pickers - ever.

Learning how to play an instrument is scientifically proven to help keep your mind sharp and to help recover from disease and injury. This is true. In fact medical researchers refer to positive brain changes that take place during learning as "neuroplasticity". (Sorry but that's what it says.) In short, when playing music, new neural brain connections develop due to the sensory, motor, and intellectual stimulus.

Since you would be a "new-adult" learner you will likely experience, as many of us have, that you must accept the gift to yourself of greater patience as you to develop the strength, "nimbleness", and precision in your fingers.

Another term also associated with learning a

new motor skill, such as playing a stringed instrument, is called "muscle memory". This term is fundamentally inaccurate within the research circles.

Kelly Cole, PhD. (University of Iowa) has undertaken extensive research in the motor learning of musical instruments. Among many of his recommendations are two in particular that may help you get started. The first is to practice specific skill "modules" (such as practicing for accuracy, phrasing, licks, speed, etc) in random order from one practice session to another. And secondly, to allow approximately a 15 minute break between your practice "modules". These short breaks allow your neural networks to begin consolidating, but even when you stop practicing for the day, functional and structural changes will continue for hours and days later - whether you are awake or asleep.
