We will learn Don's classic intro, one of the craziest 'rock and roll breaks that were a huge part of Don's unique approach to banjo. The other song is my Scruggs style, Alan Munde influenced arrangements of the great Norman Blake tune, "Billy Gray," in the key of F (which is where Norman played and sang it).

In this workshop I'll walk you through a common scale shape and show you how to turn it into a handful of useful licks that we will learn through call and response. Once we have the licks down we'll play along to a backing track to experience how they sound over a basic I IV V chord structure. If time allows we'll play along to a song with vocals and experience how these licks can be used as fills to back up a singer.

DUET SINGING Friday

Traditional Brother Style and Bluegrass Duet Singing. The way artists approach harmony singing has changed over time. The workshop will explore the foundations of duet singing in old time and early bluegrass music. We will discuss where the styles came from, how they evolved, and how they function today. The styles and harmony structure of such artists as the Delmore Brothers, the Blue Sky Boys, the Louvin Brothers, Don Reno & Red Smiley, Jim & Jesse and others will be discussed and demonstrated. Tips on how to hear and execute harmony will be offered.

Just like clockwork; Wednesday at 7 p.m. Fire up the Zoom link and there he is with a freshly pressed cowboy shirt and a sparkle in his eyes. "Howdy folks. I'm Darcy Whiteside and this is another Bluegrass 101 Covid edition. Each week we take one bluegrass song and break it down for singing and playing. This week we're doing.....OK now.... I want to hear that back beat."

It's a familiar kick off for many of us who have dutifully attended at the Pleasantview Hall every Wednesday at 7 p.m. for the past few years. Through Darcy's heart, ears and voice we have been drawn into the world and community that is Bluegrass music. Each Wednesday he shares his love and passion for the music and we are all blessed to have a front seat in this evolving songbook. Darcy is clearly one of Alberta's bluegrass treasures.

Thanks to the Northern Bluegrass Circle Music Society, it's the best two dollars you will ever spend on this planet. And boy, you are going to be educated. When you start at Camp Darcy, you may know a couple of Carter family tunes, but after a couple of years you will know the whole bluegrass family tree from Bill Monroe to the Boston sound and beyond. (Of course you might not remember who played fiddle on the 1952 recording of Well, you get the point.)

Even in these times of Covid, Darcy continues to remain a comforting constant. Shortly after a CKUA song request and exchange, the first online edition of 101 began in early April with the appropriately-chosen, 1954 Flatt and Scruggs classic, "Don't this Road Look Rough and Rocky". In the first few taped editions on You Tube, you see Darcy in a tee shirt or sweat shirt and a basic wall in the background. Later in April, with Zoom and Facebook heating up, the set is transformed. In the fourth edition Darcy leads us in the 1957 Monroe classic "Sittin' Alone in the Moonlight". MESSAGE FROM YOUR EDITOR:



This bloody ""UNPRECEDENTED"" time is testing all of us, our discipline, our respect, our honesty... Thanksgiving is coming, then Hallowe'en, then Remembrance Day, then Christmas... throw in some birthdays and retirements which are all reasons we use to get together because we love to be together. I'm becoming aware of a new found respect for illnesses such as the common cold because it's just as bad right now as COVID with respect to expectations for managing the illness.

Live music has been pretty much on hold and if you're feeling like me, you're a little cautious about the prospects of 'getting together again'. Those of you that know me, know that I love our get togethers and like to exercise my vocal chords when we do so. That's also on hold, so the only places I get to howl and make some noise are outside, mostly at our little cabin.

We're seeing people beginning to gather more than before, and in the ways we've all come to know, those risks are being managed. Yet we're continuing to see

the effects of gatherings showing up in the numbers. We're all concerned about personal risk, but also about the responsibility of protecting others. The Fiddlers are perhaps the most venturesome group and with the precautions they are exercising, it seems to be doable. Each person has a tolerance level for risk that will be discovered as we proceed into more situations in which risk must be managed.

We must be patient and respectful for each decision and situation as we cannot assume the risk for each other. We're seeing some excellent examples of humanity and I'm sure that everyone has also seen some not so excellent examples. I'm trying to focus on the positive and to support those as much as I can. Risk management was something I had to do for a living and I didn't find it acceptable to 'roll the dice'. I liked situations where risk was present and yet I had a clear path through to the comfort and safety of the other side. Many of the decisions I made had risks that would be imposed on others and that's the reason why I liked to plan and make decisions carefully.

I'm really looking forward to our future 'in person' gatherings when we can all enjoy making the music we are so passionate about AND then return to the comfort and safety of our own homes without any additional hangers on -if you know what I mean...
